Honors in the Arts Advisor Consent Form

Students applying to the HIA program must submit this completed form via email to <u>artsinstitute@stanford.edu</u> no later than Wednesday, April 16, 2025.

Since 2013, Honors in the Arts (HIA) has supported undergraduate students from across the University in combining their critical and creative interests in an interdisciplinary arts capstone project, completed over the course of their senior year. This project goes beyond the traditional boundaries of their major and may be completed individually or as a group. HIA students attend a weekly workshop where they learn skills for sustainable, independent creative research while practicing interdisciplinary critique in response to the work of their peers.

In addition to programmed support for the cohort, each HIA student works with a faculty advisor who provides feedback and guidance on the content and scope of the project. Faculty advisors may recommend relevant media and/or readings, assist the student in developing a realistic timeline for the work, and serve as a source of support during the student's capstone year. We ask that advisors meet with their students at least once each quarter and assist in evaluating the project on a quarterly basis.

Please note that an HIA faculty advisor must be an academic council member, a senior lecturer, or a Stegner Fellow, or must hold a named lectureship (e.g. Jones Lecturer). Other lecturers may be eligible if employed at Stanford for all three quarters of the advising year. HIA advisors who are not members of the academic council will receive a quarterly honorarium as a token of appreciation.
